Ethical Principle: Law-Abidance/Civic Duty

May is Law-Abidance/Civic Duty month in Leander ISD. Campuses and classrooms across the district will be discussing what Law-Abidance/Civic Duty means and completing activities that promote Law-Abidance/Civic Duty. Discuss with your child what a community is. Explain that a community consists of many people who live in an area. Every community needs different kinds of people who do different things for each other. Everyone's job is important and everyone has to do their share to make the community run smoothly. Share what you do to make the community a better place and show your civic duty.

Developmental Asset: Restraint

Shaping our kids' perspectives on restraining from participating in negative behavior is an important foundation for their healthy development. How do you discourage young people from participating in certain types of behaviors? Avoid simply labeling these activities as bad. Instead, explain the consequences of these behaviors. Keep young people informed and be open to their questions. Of course, foremost be a distinguished role model to your child.
